Since taking office, we have rejoined the Paris Climate Agreement, restored our membership in the World Health Organization, secured election to the Human Rights Council, contributed \$15 billion toward the global COVID-19 response, and sent more than 160 million doses of the COVID-19 vaccine worldwide. Even with this extraordinary progress, we know there is much more to do.

The United Nations remains critical to advancing security, climate, and foreign policy interests across the globe. May we all renew our shared commitment to build a future that advances peace, dignity, and security for all.
